Dear Friends,

One of my favorite poets died a couple of weeks ago. Mary Oliver's words are frequently the last ones I read before I go to sleep. I've quoted her in sermons and used her poems as devotions and given her books as gifts to many people. Her absence in the world makes me sad, and I didn't even know her.

Oliver wrote with simplicity and clarity about the usual things that are fodder for poets—love, relationships, human emotion, worship, God, death. The natural world is ever-present in her writing; her awe-filled observations about the seasons and animals and insects and the wonders of the outdoors are stunning.

Her daily walks—for hours at a time—were her spiritual discipline. They fed her soul and gave her the images that enabled her to create. For decades, she left her house each morning at 5:00, always with a pencil and paper. She jotted notes as she walked and then returned home to make poetry from what she saw and recorded.

She endured a brutal and abusive childhood, yet from the pain of that experience she crafted beauty and hope and healing for others. Hers was the holy work of redemption.

It's hard for me to choose only one poem of hers as my favorite, but today, this is it:

The Summer Day

Who made the world?
Who made the swan, and the black bear?
Who made the grasshopper?
This grasshopper, I mean—
the one who has flung herself out of the grass, the one who is eating sugar out of my hand, who is moving her jaws back and forth instead of up and down—
who is gazing around with her enormous and complicated eyes.

Now she lifts her pale forearms and thoroughly washes her face.

Now she snaps her wings open, and floats away. I don't know exactly what a prayer is.

I do know how to pay attention, how to fall down into the grass, how to kneel in the grass,

how to be idle and blessed,

how to stroll through the fields,

which is what I have been doing all day.

Tell me, what else should I have done?

Doesn't everything die at last, and too soon?

Tell me, what is it you plan to do

With your one wild and precious life?

May you find words that inspire you and sacred plans for your own wild and precious life.

approved that new relationship in November. Friends and colleagues from the Presbytery of Southeastern Illinois will be present to help us celebrate at the Service of Installation at 4:00 p.m. in the sanctuary. A reception will follow.

Communion Schedule

During 2019, we will continue to celebrate the sacrament of the Lord's Supper on the first Sunday of each month. At the recommendation of the Worship team, the Session has voted that the elements will be served by intinction



(coming forward as you are able to dip the bread in the cup) on the first Sunday of each quarter.

Communion. We are compiling a roster of servers now, which includes individuals who have been ordained as elders and deacons, which we will send out soon. Liturgist Training

Pastor Ann will hold a training session on Sunday, February 24, at 11:00 AM for individuals (youth and adults) who would like to serve as liturgists.

"Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those who are without a bowl of soup to eat." More than 20 years ago, this simple prayer inspired the initiation of a youth-led movement to help



hungry and hurting people around the world. Since then, young people from across the country have generated over \$100 million for soup kitchens, food banks, and other charities.

On **February 3**, Super Bowl Sunday, our youth/college group will host a "Tackle Hunger Souper Bowl of Caring," featuring homemade soups in the lounge following the annual meeting. Any monies given as a free will offering will be reported to the national office as our Souper Bowl of Caring. 
In Search of Van Keys

From the Desk of the Deacons

2018 is now in the past and the Deacons are looking forward to 2019. Before we move on we need to say thank you to all who supported the Deacons through their offer-

ings, their time, and their talents. Special thanks to Bill Garrison who served as our Chairperson for 2018. Stepping up to head the



Deacons in 2019 is Kolby Riggle. As you plan for 2019 mark your calendar for the church picnic on September 22, 2019 at the Hideaway.

The 2018 Christmas Basket program enjoyed another year of success. Special thanks to Jay Cline who spearheaded the event. Providing valuable behind the scenes support were Nick de Place and Sheila Smiley. This is truly a church-wide event. The financial support from individual church members and church groups, as well as discounts from County Market on purchased food items were outstanding. Labor to gather food items, put together boxes, fill boxes, distribute food boxes and clean up was a total church effort: thank you to all who pitched in to make 2018 a success.

On the Deacon radar this year is the Food Pantry. For many years, Marj Gilliland has been the primary individual who has taken care of the daily distribution of food items. Many have provided support by driving to Bloomington to the food bank every month, unloading, and stocking the shelves and fridge. Things change with time. Marj is no longer able to dedicate the time to run this operation. No one has stepped forward to replace her. Currently the office staff is carrying the load to keep the pantry running. This is not a function of the office staff. The Deacons are evaluating this program and would appreciate your thoughts on the topic. No decision has been made at this time. A couple of ideas have been discussed:

- Seek a volunteer(s) from the congregation to take over the operation of the program. If a volunteer(s) came forward then a discussion with that individual or individuals on how to organize the program would occur.
 We could modify distribution times that might be more manageable for all concerned parties. This would be an opportunity for the new program manager to revise the operation.
- Change our approach to this community outreach program. Currently the program gets referrals from CAP

and those individuals come to the church to receive food. An individual can only receive food once every six months. The food that is received comes primarily from the Eastern Illinois Food Bank. Our contract with them puts limits on how the food is distributed. What is distributed is limited to what is received. There are a number of food pantries throughout our community. Ours is one of the smaller ones. Jay Cline reported at the January 2019 Deacon meeting that he took several left over food baskets to Dayspring, a woman's shelter that also accepts children up to the age of 18. He reported how the children were delighted to see fresh milk. Jay said that everyone was very appreciative of the fresh food items. Sharing that experience led the group to talk about another approach to providing food support for those in need in our community. The idea was to adopt an organization like Dayspring for a year and to work with that organization to provide **fresh** food at least once a month. If this idea were to be adopted then the food pantry would close. Each year the deacons would identify a community recipient.

What are your thoughts? Grab a Deacon and share with them, please.

The final thought from the Deacons is to ask everyone to support the deacons with their time, their talents, and their donations.

Llamas from Heifer International: What started as an



Backpack Program: During January, members and friends were encouraged to bring food items for the Feed the Children Backpack Program. On Souper Bowl Sunday, February 3, a free will offering will be collected for the same program. This important ministry in Danville ensures that local children whose families experience food insecurity have a backpack filled with food to take home from school each weekend.

Blanket Sunday

This year, we have the opportunity to blanket the world in the best way . . . with love! During the month of February,



we are partnering with Church World Service, which provides blankets to folks who are homeless; to those who have lost their bedding and belongings in hurricanes, tornadoes, fires, and floods; and to emergency shelters where people go who

have fled destroyed homes and abusive relationships.

For \$10, you can purchase a blanket, which will be a blessing to the one who receives it. You don't even have to go shopping. Just put \$10 in the CWS offering envelopes in the pews or in the offering plate (make sure you designate it for "Blanket Sunday"). We'll let you know at the end of the month how many blankets we were able to provide.



Love in the Name of Christ

Love INC partners with over 30 churches in Vermilion County. Through our partnership, churches refer clients in need to Love INC. This allows our churches to focus on their missions while we look at individual needs and determine which church or social agency can best work with our clients. When a client is referred, we do an intake to get background information, assess the needs and verify the information, refer to a church or agency, and do a follow-up call. At each step a prayer is offered.

Our mission is to mobilize local churches, to transform lives and communities in the Name of Christ. Some of churches/agencies that we work with and services we provide are:

- Fair Hope Children's Ministry (United Methodist churches): We make an appointment for families to receive clothes for children, birth to 18.
- Food pantries: Multiple agencies and churches help with this, including First Presbyterian Church.
- Medication help: First Presbyterian Church, Salvation Army, St. Vincent DePaul.
- Job information: We give lists of agencies to apply for jobs and refer clients to the Goodwill Career Center.
 We provide information about DACC, which has GED classes and a Career Services and American Job Center. Love INC pays the fee for clients to take the GED test.
- Our Brother's Keeper (Second Church of Christ): We refer clients who are homeless or were involved in domestic abuse. They receive pots, pans, dishes, silverware, glasses, cleaning supplies, etc.
- Diapers (Danville Alliance Church): Clients receive a small packet of diapers.
- Linens (Central Christian Church): Clients receive bedding, towels, etc.
- Angel Moms of Vermilion County: Provide grief support for moms who have lost children.
- I Grow: Early childhood programs.
- Aunt Martha's: Health and medical help.
- Seniors: Faith in Action and CRIS Senior Services.

Per Capita

Per capita is one of the ways that all of the congregations



in the PC(USA) are connected. Together we mutually share the costs of operating the larger church (traveling/gathering, training pastors and ruling elders, serving in the life of the wider church, and discerning in groups small and large where God is leading us).

The 2019 per capita fee for each member (excluding children who have not been confirmed) is \$42. The funds are divided among the Presbytery of Southeastern Illinois (\$29.24); the Synod of Lincoln Trails (\$3.81); and the General Assembly (\$8.95).

Funds not paid by individual members must come from the church budget, meaning that less ministry can be done. Please consider paying your per capita this year.


