

Dear Friends,

A couple of years ago, Kristin Schell of Austin, Texas, realized that she knew few of her neighbors on the street where she and her family had lived for a decade. Looking for a way to connect and to live out Jesus' commandment to love her neighbors, Kristin put an ordinary picnic table in her front yard, painted it turquoise, and began inviting friends and neighbors to join her. Within a few hours, she began meeting people. She said her life changed that day and so did her community. Now the table is a gathering place for kids who do their homework and have lemonade stands, as well as adults who have established bonds over coffee and sweet tea.

With that single gesture of placing a table in her front yard and then showing up for people, Schell embraced hospitality as a core value and a significant way of living out her faith.

She started a movement. Today there are turquoise tables all across the nation—in the front yards of homes and many churches. Thanks to the generosity of Dick and Norma Burch, First Presbyterian Church will soon have its own turquoise table under the magnolia tree on the north lawn!

Dick already has plans to sit at the table occasionally on nice days with a cooler of water and meet neighbors who pass by. I hope to spend some time out there myself. And you, members and friends, are invited to gather there as well, to introduce yourselves to folks who pass by, offer a cool drink of water, and extend to neighbors during the week the same hospitality of Jesus Christ that we profess to believe on Sunday mornings.

Last year, when the congregation did the Holy Cow survey, the top three priorities you identified focused on connecting with people: attracting families with children and youth, reaching new people, and working to renew and revitalize the community around the church. Can a turquoise table help us do those things? We can try.

If you're interested in reading Kristin Schell's story, she wrote a book aptly titled *The Turquoise Table:* Finding Community and Connection in Your Own Front Yard. It's available on Amazon and Barnes & Noble, in paperback and downloadable form.

Faith and Patriotism


On May 19 and 26, the adult study group that meets Sundays at **noon** will consider the relationship between our

A New Gift to the Church

Early this year, we were notified that the church was named a beneficiary of the Herbert Zillman Irrevocable Trust. When the requisite paperwork had been completed, we received a check for \$71,558.77, which is now part of the church's Managed Funds portfolio.

A quick look at the membership rolls revealed that Mr. Zillman was never a member of First Presbyterian Church, although he may have attended worship here occasionally. Thanks to Bob Boesdorfer and Libby Milner, we have learned a few things about him, which you should know, given his generosity to the church.

Herbert Arthur Zillman died in 1989 at the age of 80. He was married to Marybelle Gobin (Zillman) who preceded him in death. They had no children. He had three brothers, Martin, Walter, and Arnold; one sister, Ella Wright; and was close friends with (and a neighbor of) Don Koenig, who was a member here. Mr. Zillman retired from the U.S. Post Office. He was a member of Immanuel Lutheran Church, the other beneficiary of his estate.

Today, some 30 years after his death, we give thanks to God for the life and legacy of Herbert Zillman, who was moved to bless First Presbyterian for reasons we do not know. Let us be grateful for his thoughtful stewardship.

Per Capita

Per capita is one of the ways that all of the congregations in the PC(USA) are connected. Together we mutually share the costs of operating the larger church (traveling/gathering, training pastors and ruling elders, serving in the life of the wider church, and discerning in groups small and large where God is leading us).

The 2019 per capita fee for each member (excluding children who have not been confirmed) is \$42. The funds are divided among the Presbytery of Southeastern Illinois (\$29.24); the Synod of Lincoln Trails (\$3.81); and the General Assembly (\$8.95). The Session encourages all members to pay your fair share.

His MS in Agricultural Economics has since taken him to the World Bank in Nigeria and most recently the United Nation's World Food Program. His job is to ensure that nutrition is streamlined in all WFP programs throughout Africa. We can be proud of John and pleased with our participation in his success. This is truly International Mission at its best.

John and his wife, Marynia will soon be blessed with their first child. As of this writing John is traveling between his job in Rome and his home in Malawi, as the baby will be born in Malawi. To join in the celebration of this joyous event, a "baby fund" has been created at the church for members and friends to donate to. Greetings to you from the Deacons. We continue on our quest to serve the Church and the Church's mission. In that light, the discussion continues on the Food Pantry.




We are appreciative of the comments shared with us by various DEACONS members of the congregation and continue to seek your thoughts.
