Confirmation Class Meeting



Habitat for Humanity Work Day

On Saturday, **January 25, 2020**, First Presbyterian Church will work on a Habitat house at 711 W. Columbia St. in Danville, 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. There will be tasks for people of all skill levels:

Interior Work:

- cut and install furring strips in kitchen area for drywall nailers (basic carpentry skills needed; requires step ladder use);
- remove old ceiling lights (basic skills; step stool use);
- prime ceilings in front bedrooms (basic skills; some ladder work);
- install floor leveler, add concrete to areas that have been removed for plumbing repairs (knee pads);
- install pieces of drywall in small areas (basic skills; utility knife & tape measure, cordless screw gun use);
- lightly sand bedroom walls, apply primer as needed (basic skills; some step stool use);
- install framing as needed on closet door frames (basic carpentry skills; saw, tape measure, level);
- remove tack strip, miscellaneous nails, and other items to prep for drywall;
- clean and organize

Exterior work (depends on weather and mostly requires significant carpentry skills):

- · siding removal & repairs;
- demo at NE corner of home; repair framing and sheathing;
- demo and reframe garage window; install windows; repair siding;
- shed demolition (basic skills, basic tools, Sawzall and ladder);
- rebuild shed—an all-day job requiring fine carpentry skills

There is sign-up sheet in the office for those who would like to work.


Annual Meeting of the Congregation





Report on Presbytery Stated Meeting

November 21, 2019 in Effingham, Illinois

Some of the topics considered at a presbytery meeting probably seem like "housekeeping"—for example, the consideration of revisions to the presbytery manual on parental leave (approved), or changes to the guidelines for pastors to use study leave (approved). On the other hand this meeting featured elections , including the (a) moderator and vice-moderator; (b) members of the General Council; (c) members of the Committee on Representation (COR); (d) members of the Committee on Preparation for Ministry (CPM), (e) the Synod Commissioner (Pastor Ann Schwartz to serve till 2022), and (f) Commissioners to the 224th General Assembly (St. Louis MO; June 20–27, 2022).

The CPM reported that seven persons are currently under care, including James Potts from First Presbyterian-Danville. The CPM moved that the Preparation for Ministry Book of Order G-2.0607(b) requirement be waived for James. [This requirement states that a candidate for service as a minister of the Word and Sacrament must demonstrate to the presbytery under whose care he is that he has completed an undergraduate degree from an accredited college or university.] James does not have a bachelor's degree—but he successfully completed his Master of Divinity degree from McCormick Seminary and has since served two congregations in a professional, but not an ordained, capacity. The affirmative vote to this motion by the Presbytery of Southeastern Illinois now allows James to seek ordination. (And, he has initiated work toward a bachelor's degree in psychology.)

Financial matters were presented—both expenditures and receipts by Presbytery through September 30, 2019, and a proposed budget for 2020. Progress was reported on the sale of the buildings of three churches that have closed (Argenta, Mt. Vernon, Mt. Carmel). References to declining membership and financial resources throughout the Presbytery were voiced.

During the Worship service, Karen Russell, pastor of First Presbyterian of Palestine Church, preached a rousing sermon on "serving with imagination," based on Luke 5:36–39, the parable about the problems generated by placing new wine in old wineskins.

Three Cheese Hot Artichoke Dip

1 (8 oz) block cream cheese, softened

1 c mayonnaise

1 (14 oz) can artichoke hearts, drained and chopped

2 green onions, sliced thin

1/2 c grated Parmesan

1 c shredded mozzarella

Dash hot sauce

Dash Worcestershire sauce

Salt and pepper

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In large mixing bowl, beat the cream cheese with hand held electric mixer until smooth. Beat in mayonnaise until smooth. Add remaining ingredients and stir until combined. Transfer dip to a pie plate or shallow dish. Bake 30-40 minutes until the top is golden brown and the dip is bubbling. Serve hot with crackers, tortilla chips, bread, or veggies. (Served for refreshments on December 15.)
