Dear Members and Friends,

We last worshiped together in the sanctuary on March 22, 2020. Remember how strange it was in the weeks leading up to that day? We had stopped shaking hands and hugging during the passing of the peace and had put hand sanitizer in the pews, thinking we could keep the germs at bay. News about the spread of coronavirus dominated our screens, but it seemed so far away. Still, there was a sense of foreboding.

In mid-March, we were hearing about a state shutdown. The Session made the decision to close the building and move to virtual worship and meetings. Wade and I made a quick trip to Bloomington on March 21 to celebrate our daughter Samantha's birthday, not knowing when we would see our daughters again. The not knowing, the uncertainty of it all was hardest for me. It still is.

Writer and adventurer, Blair Braverman raced and completed the 2019 Iditarod, the 1,000-mile dogsled race in Alaska. In a recent interview (on Kara Swisher's podcast, "Sway"), she shared what she has come to know about resilience from the challenges of enduring under difficult and unknown circumstances:

"So the similarity between the pandemic and mushing [a team of dogs pulling a sled in the snow] is that you don't know how far you're going, and you don't know how much it will take to get there. Every time I harness up my dogs, and they're barking, and they run out of the yard and onto the trail, they don't know if they're going two miles or if they're going 200 miles. They do not know. They're just going to run, and they'll tire themselves out if I don't slow them down, because they aren't able to see ahead.

"So, in order to get my team to endure something of an incredible distance, I need to force them to rest before they want to. And that's actually the hardest thing. People ask us how we teach sled dogs to run. And the answer is, you literally put a harness on them, and they run. You don't have to teach anything, but you do have to teach them to rest, and that is a challenge. It is a lot easier to prevent fatigue than to recover from it.

Just to bring that back to the pandemic, what I would just say is, people are pushing themselves really hard. And you need to make sure that you're acting as if it could go forever. You need to be resting, taking care of yourself, getting enough sleep, connecting with your friends. All these things are things we feel like we can push to later. But if you get too isolated or scared or any of these things, it's just going to be so hard to undo."

So for those of you who are pushing to accomplish your usual tasks, are sleeping poorly, are easily distracted and anxious, are often unmotivated, and/or are exhausted, take a lesson from the dogs . . . and stop pushing yourself so hard! Rest your bodies, minds, and spirits. We are still in the midst of a pandemic, a stressful and seemingly endless disruption of normal.

Even as we line up for vaccines and persist with the mask-wearing, we also ought to care for ourselves in other ways—because it's Lent, because we're tired, and because we are God's beloved and limited children.

## Mission Matters

### Medical Debt Mission Project

Our church has joined the presbytery-wide effort to cancel \$1.7 million of medical debt burdening our friends and neighbors in the 44 counties that make up the Presbytery of Southeastern Illinois. We are partnering with RIP Medical Debt ([ripmedicaldebt.org/](http://ripmedicaldebt.org/)), one of several organizations that pools money from donors to buy medical debt, which is then forgiven with no tax consequences for the donors or recipients.

Every \$10,000 donated to RIP Medical Debt can abolish \$1 million worth of debt. So far, Paula has received \$452, which actually exceeds the goal of \$216.19 from each of the 79 churches of our region. However, I encourage you to give during the next couple of weeks if you haven't already, so that we can move our presbytery closer to helping more people. Make your checks payable to the church, with "RIP Medical Debt" in the memo line, and send them to Paula.

### One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS)

Around the world, millions of people lack access to sustainable food sources, clean water, sanitation, education, and opportunity. The three programs supported by One Great Hour of

Sharing—Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, the Presbyterian Hunger Program, and Self-Development of People—all work in different ways to serve individuals and communities in need. From initial disaster response to ongoing community development, their work fits together to provide people with safety, sustenance, and hope.

The OGHS is the single, largest way that Presbyterians come together every year to work for a better world. We will receive the traditional Easter special offering until the end of April. You will find more information on OGHS in your Lent bag, including an offering envelope and a fish coin bank, along with a daily calendar of suggestions for collecting your coins. You can mail your checks to Paula at the office with “OGHS” in the memo line. And if you are saving coins, you can drop off your fish bank at the church.

### **Per Capita**

Each member of the congregation is asked to pay \$42 for the year’s per capita charge. The fees are divided among the Presbytery, Synod, and General Assembly, and support the work of the larger church. What is not paid by members must come from the General Fund. Please send a check for your \$42 (per member) to Paula at the church address. Write “2021 per capita” in the memo line.

### **Love INC Invitation**

On Sunday, March 21, 2021 Love INC of Vermilion County will host their **Annual Fundraising** event. Due to the COVID restrictions currently in place, this year’s event will be the **UN-banquet**.

Instead of gathering at the Bremer Conference Center, you are invited watch the UN-banquet video program from the safety and comfort of your home. You will hear testimonies from partner ministries, supporters, volunteers, and neighbors whose lives are being transformed. John Ligtenberg, Love INC National Board member and longtime Executive Director of Love INC of the Black Hills, will be the keynote speaker (via video).

The fundraising goal for this year’s event is \$30,000, which is strictly for current operating costs to provide much-needed services to clients. Since they won’t be renting a venue, paying a caterer, or buying decorations, a greater portion of the funds raised will be used to empower families and transform the lives of our neighbors in the name of Christ.

## Session Meeting Highlights

The Session met via Zoom on February 16, 2021 for a stated meeting:

- 10 out of 12 elders were present
- Approved the Annual Statistical Report submitted to the denomination
- Discussed article on Courageous Leadership, particularly during a time of great uncertainty and strain on churches
- Cancelled February 21 Coffee Talk with the Session since the annual meeting was Feb. 14
- Offered feedback on annual meeting and annual report and approved keeping the report small (under 20 pages) for future years
- Reviewed financial reports and found everything in order
- Discussed importance of RIP Debt Relief mission project and encouraged members to give \$3.40 per person
- Approved having Linda Anderson and Roger Cornwell serve as congregational representatives to the Personnel Team
- Voted to continue virtual worship and gathering through March and to reassess at the next Session meeting
- Prayed for the congregation, family and friends, and those around the country impacted by the dangerous weather conditions

## Presbytery News

The stated meeting of the PSEI again was held by Zoom call. At least 76 persons were in attendance. The meeting opened with prayer, led by Moderator Rev. Heidi Weatherford.

The first 40 pages or so of the 51-page docket dealt with a consent agenda, mainly to provide information generated by committees and ministry teams.

The Committee on Ministry presented Toby Montgomery, who grew up in First Presbyterian Church, Mattoon, as an Inquirer to Candidate for Ministry of Word and Sacrament. He is presently Youth Director at FPC-Mattoon and is taking courses at the University of Dubuque Theological Seminary. He also helped lead the worship service held at the end of the stated meeting.

Presbytery-wide concerns include the following:

- At present 39/79 congregations need to have moderators appointed and/or trained to conduct Session meetings.
- Eleven PSEI churches did not pay their per capita contributions in 2020.
- PSEI expenses for 2020 were brought down from 2019, and they will need to be brought down further in the next 5 years—barring unforeseen increases in revenue. Both savings and membership are declining.
- To address this possible shortfall, the General Council is recommending that two positions—Stated Clerk (SC) and Presbyter for Congregational Care (PCC)—be combined into one position. (At present the SC and PCC are each appointed for a 65% of a full-time position.)

PSEI will have a called meeting on April 15 to move forward with a job description for this new position. The position will be advertised, and it is hoped the job search can be completed by August or September. It is also possible that an interim person could be selected for this position while PSEI evaluates where God is guiding us into the future.

Jason Schiller made the telling point that just downsizing isn't the answer. It is worth considering that the PSEI should be searching ways to use its financial resources for Mission.

The meeting concluded with a communion service led by Rev. Rachel Matthews. Participants were encouraged to send their offering to Rest in Peace Medical Debt ([www.ripmedicaldebt.org](http://www.ripmedicaldebt.org)), an organization that buys debts and then forgives them with no tax consequences for the donor or recipients.
